I so enjoy singing the old Christmas songs. They seem to connect me to the

it has in the past. Take "O Holy Night", for instance:

*O holy night! The stars are brightly shining,
It is the night of our dear Saviour's birth.
Long lay the world in sin and error pining,
Till He appear'd and the soul felt its worth.
A thrill of hope, the weary world rejoices,
For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn.*

*Fall on your knees!
O hear the angel voices!
O night divine, O night when Christ was born;*

We are living in a weary world right now. Weary from being isolated. Weary from being torn by conflicting information. Weary from not seeing smiles, or frowns, for that matter. Weary because it takes more energy to navigate a day than it used to. We also live in a society that is sliding further and further away from the rule of Christ. As frustrating as this is, it is not unique in history.

This Christmas you'll probably watch Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*. It was written in a time when there was great poverty; when the poor barely made a living; when people were weary from the cost of living (literally!); when workhouses and orphanages were synonymous; and when large families, high mortality rates, and illness were the norm.

Or go back further to the time of Christ. The Jewish people had been oppressed in their own homeland for decades. They longed for the freedom to live and worship without Roman laws and punishments looming constantly.

The lyrics go, "A thrill of hope, the weary world rejoices, For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn." When Jesus left his throne in heaven and took on flesh (the incarnation), He brought the thrill of hope to a weary world. This hope remains today. It is the hope that we who know Him as Savior have an eternal home, and this is not it. It is a sure hope of victory over death and disease. It's why both Bonnie's parents and mine have said, "We'd rather have you come than be isolated without human contact. Besides, we want to go home. It doesn't matter how we get there." Jesus' invasion into the world brought hope for new life, eternal life, abundant life.

worth.” The world we live in is stuck in sin and errors as long as it rejects Christ, captured by the futile search for personal pleasure only to find temporary fixes. Just like drugs, their effects wear off and the empty misery of sin returns. God’s love for us was strong enough to send His Son. The truth is we are all sinners who deserve eternal death, but God loved us. He valued us. He cared for us enough to die on a cross to bear our sins. So the lyrics were right, “Till He appeared and the soul felt its worth”. Our worth is not in our accomplishments, but in His value of us. He valued us so much that, while we were sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8)

If you are struggling with weariness or sin this season, I’d like to suggest you ponder what God did on that holy night when our dear Savior was born. Just maybe, you will be caught up in the thrill of hope.


RVC MEN
